



COMMUNICATIONS, ADVOCACY & SOCIAL MEDIA PACK FOR THE LAUNCH OF THE NURTURING CARE FRAMEWORK AT THE WORLD HEALTH ASSEMBLY, GENEVA 23 May 2018

OVERVIEW

The Nurturing Care Framework will be launched at the World Health Assembly (WHA), in Geneva at 6pm (GMT +2) on Wednesday 23 May 2018.

The World Health Organization, UNICEF and the World Bank Group, in collaboration with the Partnership for Maternal, Newborn & Child Health, the Early Childhood Development Action Network and many other partners, have developed a Nurturing Care Framework for early childhood development.

The Nurturing Care Framework was created in response to strong evidence and growing recognition that the early years are critical for human development. It sets out the most effective policies and services that will help parents and caregivers provide nurturing care for babies. To reach their full potential, children need the five inter-related and indivisible components of nurturing care: good health, adequate nutrition, safety and security, responsive caregiving and opportunities for learning.

Investing in early childhood development is one of the best investments a country can make to boost economic growth, promote peaceful and sustainable societies, and eliminate extreme poverty and inequality. Equally important, investing in early childhood development is necessary to uphold the right of every child to survive and thrive.

The Framework provides an evidence-based road map for action and outlines how policies and services can support parents, families, other caregivers and communities in providing nurturing care for young children. It calls for attention to be paid to communities where children are most at risk of being left behind.

The Nurturing Care Framework is designed to mobilise a coalition of parents and caregivers, national governments, civil society groups, academics, the United Nations, the private sector, educational institutions and service providers to ensure every baby gets the best start in life.

The WHA will spotlight Early Childhood Development this year, so there is a unique opportunity to elevate the issue of nurturing care among policymakers and political leaders.

Nurturing, protecting and supporting babies from pregnancy to age three years is essential to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), with a specific target (SDG 4.2) of ensuring all boys and girls have access to quality early childhood development. It will also help countries achieve the targets of the Every Woman Every Child Global Strategy for Women's, Children's and Adolescents' Health.

TOPLINE KEY MESSAGES

- 1. The human brain develops faster from pregnancy to age three than at any other time.
- 2. Over 80% of a human brain is formed by the age of three years.
- 3. The nurture and support provided to children in the earliest years by parents and caregivers is critical for healthy brain development.
- 4. In the first years of life, parents, intimate family members and caregivers are the closest to the young child and thus the best providers of Nurturing Care. In order to provide caregivers with time and resources to provide nurturing care, policies, services and community supports need to be in place.
- 5. The time to act is now; there is compelling evidence from science and economics to drive increased investments in early childhood development with policies and services that support primary caregivers in their critical role in providing nurturing care.
- 6. Nurturing care increases health, productivity and social cohesion throughout a lifetime, and the benefits continue into the next generation.
- 250 million children under the age of five in low- and middle-income countries more than four out of every ten children – are at greater risk of not reaching their development potential due to poverty and neglect.
- 8. Research shows that for every US\$1 spent on early childhood development interventions, the return on investment can be as high as US\$13.
- 9. The Nurturing Care Framework provides a roadmap for action. It builds upon the latest scientific evidence to set out the most effective policies and interventions that can improve early childhood development.
- 10.It is designed to mobilise a coalition of parents and caregivers, national governments, civil society groups, academics, the United Nations, the private sector, educational institutions and service providers, to ensure every child gets the best start in life.
- 11.Nurturing, protecting and supporting children from pregnancy to three years of age is essential to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals. SDG 4 includes a target of ensuring all boys and girls have access to quality early childhood development.

HOW TO PROVIDE COMMUNICATIONS SUPPORT FOR THE LAUNCH OF THE NURTURING CARE FRAMEWORK

1. Pitch the launch of the Framework to your national or regional media.

2. Link the launch of the Framework to other stories you're pitching on ECD.

3. Offer journalists an interview with a member of your WHA delegation, or another technical expert.

4. Have a ECD expert in your country write a blog for your national website, or an opinion piece for a national media outlet on the launch of the Nurturing Care Framework, the importance of nurturing care to build babies' brains, and the need to invest in Early Childhood Development.

5. Reach out to an influencer or a media partner to collaborate on promoting the launch of the Framework.

HOW TO PROVIDE ADVOCACY SUPPORT FOR THE LAUNCH OF THE NURTURING CARE FRAMEWORK

- 1. Arrange a meeting with relevant decision makers in your government (i.e. health minister, finance minister etc.) to brief them on the launch of the Nurturing Care Framework and leave them with a copy of the report and the executive summary.
- 2. Use the Framework to advocate for your government to invest more in early childhood development.
- 3. If you work with a G20 government, leverage the launch of the Framework to advocate for them to announce a substantial investment in ECD at the G20 in Argentina (30 November-1 December).
